

## George Couros

George Couros (@gcouros) is the Division Principal of Innovative Teaching & Learning for Parkland School Division, Alberta, Canada. George resides at the Centre for Education working closely with the Future Team, Lead Team, Learning Services Department and Information Technology Department where he pushes the leading edge in implementing Alberta Education's new Goal Two – Educational Transformation. George is a leader on the effective use of social media to improve and engage student and staff learning while also connecting organizations in an open and transparent way. He is a sought after speaker on the topic of advancing student learning and engagement. ## Pasi Sahlberg

Pasi Sahlberg is Finnish educator and scholar. He worked as a school teacher, teacher educator and policy advisor in Finland and has studied education systems and reforms around the world. His best-seller book 'Finnish Lessons: What can the world learn from educational change in Finland' (Teachers College Press, 2011) won the 2013 Grawemeyer Award. He is a former Director General of CIMO (Centre for International Mobility and Cooperation) in Helsinki and currently a visiting Professor of Practice at Harvard University's Graduate School of Education in Cambridge, MA, USA.

He is experienced in classroom teaching, training teachers and leaders, coaching schools and advising education policy-makers around the world. Pasi is an international speaker and writer and has given more than 300 keynote speeches and published over 100 articles, chapters and books on education.

David Price, OBE, is a learning futurist and a Senior Associate at the Innovation Unit, a not-for-profit enterprise committed to solving social challenges, in London. 	<b>SESSION 2A: Create, Innovate, Voice - Global Trends In Education For Student Success - George Couros</b> <i>In this workshop, George will highlight some of the trends that are happening in education and the world and how we create a learning environment that is engaging for students. By giving them the ability to create meaningful learning, be innovative, and empower them with a voice, we will see students succeeding long after their time in school.</i>
	<b>SESSION 2B: Reflecting On The Leadership Standard - Niel Smith &amp; Lesley Street</b> <i>This session introduces the idea of active career management so that you can reach your full potential. The Australian Professional Standard for Principals describes the crucial role of the principal, outlines the three leadership requirements, details the five professional practices and sets out what principals are expected to know, understand and do to achieve excellence in their work. Most school leaders have a good understanding of the Principal Standard but the focus for this session is on beginning to unpack what it means at a personal level to be an effective school leader in a time of critical and significant change. The session explores the question - So what do I have to do to be seen as a potential senior leader in the West Australian educational context? This practical session will explore the following: Know yourself, know where you want to go, build a positive reputation; create effective networks, develop your personal presentation style, heighten your interpersonal capabilities and take action to develop your expertise, skills and knowledge to enhance your career.</i>
	<b>SESSION 2C: Quality Educational Leadership Recognised Through Principal Certification - Louisa Rennie</b> <i>This workshop will provide participants with background information about the research underpinning the work PAI is doing to develop the Australian Principal Certification Program, including discussion of the unique contexts within which certification occurs, the vision and purpose of various international certification programs and some of the lessons learnt in developing and implementing a successful certification program. This workshop will explore how principals might prepare for Certification using a simple four step process.</i>
	<b>SESSION 2D: The Powerful Learning Framework - Literacy, Numeracy and Curiosity – Implementing Deep School Reform in Melbourne, Australia - Wayne Craig</b> <i>In this session Wayne Craig will describe strategies for a "powerful learning" framework, outlining the drivers of change; the right direction for reform; and the theories of action and models of practice as a means of raising student achievement. Powerful Learning includes an unrelenting focus on the "instructional core" – curriculum innovation, professional development and student voice - and places what students actually do, and the sense they make of it, at the centre.</i>
	<b>SESSION 2E: Year 7 Transition To Highschool - Challenges and Opportunities Unpacked - Bruno Faletti</b> <i>Transition to the high school environment has been widely recognised as a stressful event for students, which in many cases becomes the pre-cursor for inappropriate lifestyle choices. The change to a more populated, geographically larger campus and sometimes a less personal environment, where young people go from being "a big fish in a small pond" to a small fish in a big pond" can be overwhelming. Some students, in their quest to fit in will bow to inappropriate peer pressure and experiment with smoking, alcohol and other drug (AOD) use. This spike in AOD use in transition to high school, has been well documented in research and surveys. While this is a challenge to school leaders it is also a ripe opportunity to integrate resilience and drug education into a health education curriculum. Schools that embrace resilience education will not only serve young people during their years at high school, but assist with healthy decision making as they move into adult life.</i>
	<b>SESSION 2F: Leadership Framework : Going One To One</b> <i>Successful implementation of a one-to-one program doesn't have to be a daunting process, but it's on par with any significant systemwide change. It requires change management skills, such as planning, organising, staffing, resourcing, and problem-solving. And keep in mind that the "process" is not a linear one—it's iterative, and some activities happen in parallel. Explore a framework that will help your school take the journey to One to One.</i>

*In many parts of the world, public schooling is in crisis. Competition, choice, test-based accountability and fast-track teacher preparation have become common tactics to address that crisis and improve teaching and learning schools. This presentation shows that there is an alternative way to transform education systems and boost learning for all students. It is the way of inclusion and equity, teacher and leader professionalism, collaborative practice, and trust-based responsibility that has been the way Finland has since the 1970s. Conclusion is that there are both obvious and hidden lessons from Finland for those seeking to transform education systems and respond to global education crisis. What is needed is the right blend of ingenuity, time, patience, and determination.*

## SESSION 4A: Equality, Equity & Quality of Education in a Global Perspective - Pasi Sahlberg

*This workshop is built around concepts of equality, equity and quality in education. We first look at how equality of wealth distribution in different developed countries is linked to their educational performance in international student assessments. Then we take the definition of equity in education as defined by the Gonski Report and look at how quality of student achievement and equity of these outcomes are connected. Finally, lessons from Finland and other high-performing school systems will offer this workshop some guidance for practical steps to address consequences of inequality and enhance equity at the level of every school in Australian context.*

## SESSION 4B: A Whole School Approach To Resilience, Road & Drug Education - With A Case Study Focus - Mick Jackson Pierce

*Changing Health Acting Together (CHAT) is a SDERA initiative based on sound research and an extensive literature review focusing on the Health Promoting Schools framework undertaken by SDERA in 2009. The CHAT model was also developed in response to early findings from a collaborative research project conducted in 2009 between SDERA and the Child Health Promotion Research Centre at Edith Cowan University - the Keeping in Touch (KIT) Plus Research Project. CHAT is a robust model, underpinned by extensive research, the Principles for School Drug Education and the Health Promoting Schools Framework. This session will offer insight into the CHAT initiative which offers intensive in-school support to guide schools, step-by-step as they develop a best practice whole-school approach to Resilience, Drug and Road Safety Education. It will also explain the CHAT process which enables schools to identify needs, develop actions and implement changes, ensuring they are relevant and grounded in the ethos of the school and the needs of the local community.*

## SESSION 4C: Quality Educational Leadership Recognised Through Principal Certification - Louisa Rennie
